## MPI - Summary of San Diego County Community College drug policies 2013:

- It seems that all of the community colleges have an anti-drug policy that <u>could</u> apply to medical marijuana use on campus property. However, none of the colleges specifically mentions medical marijuana in their anti-drug policies.
- Several of the junior colleges mentioned that violators of federal law will be subject to disciplinary action. Since medical marijuana is illegal by federal law, it seems that the colleges emphasizing federal law (MiraCosta, San Diego Community College District, and Southwestern) might be more likely to enforce policies against medical marijuana than those that don't explicitly refer to federal law. It is unclear whether colleges that refer to state laws (or "law" more generally) in their anti-drug policies will enforce policies against medical marijuana use.
- All of the junior colleges' drug policies apply to drug use/ sale/ possession on campus.
- Any student who has been convicted of an offense under federal law is ineligible to receive federal student financial aid for at least one year after the offense and possibly indefinitely (depending on the frequency of the offense and whether the drug-related offense was for the sale or possession of drugs). Since medical marijuana is illegal under federal law, young people caught using medical marijuana may not be eligible for federal financial aid. Federal aid pays for education expenses at 4-year, 2-year, and technical/vocational schools.
- Many technical schools do not have explicit anti-drug policies—particularly the online schools that do not require students to take classes on a physical campus. However, many of the schools offer federal student aid. Students who have been convicted for marijuana use/sale/possession under federal law may not be eligible for aid from these schools.
- Medical technical schools may require students and/or applicants to complete a drug screening, particularly if they require students to complete a clinical externship at a health care facility. Students working at a health care facility are required to pass a drug screening before their externship begins and may be subject to random drug testing once their externship begins.
